Walmart Foundation's California State Giving Program Gives \$120,000 in Grants to Los Angeles County Nonprofits Grants Will Support Youth, Homeless Families and Emergency Assistance Resources

LOS ANGELES, Calif., August 17, 2010 – The Walmart Foundation's California State Giving Program today announced \$120,000 in grants to Los Angeles County nonprofits: Upward Bound House, Foothill Unity Center, El Monte/South El Monte Emergency Resources Association and Ettie Lee Youth and Family Services. The grants will support community programs focused on reaching out to homeless families, at-risk youth and emergency assistance resources.

"The Walmart Foundation's California State Giving Program supports community organizations focused on helping people live better lives, and we are proud to support the unique community outreach programs in Los Angeles County," said Kimberly Sentovich, Senior Vice President of the Pacific Division for Walmart. "While families continue to face the harsh realities of this economy, we are thrilled to partner with organizations meeting these challenges head on."

A \$45,000 grant to the **Upward Bound House Family Place** will support the placement of 21 families in a six to nine month long program providing housing, job training and financial literacy workshops with the goal of retaining permanent housing. The grant will directly fund supplies for activities; general program expenses; and support compensation for case managers who serve on the frontlines of working with families to find the root of their chronic homelessness.

"As homelessness continues to increase at a dramatic rate, we are finding more families looking for opportunities to change their lives for the better," said David Snow, Executive Director of the Upward Bound House. "We appreciate the Walmart Foundation and its support to provide the opportunity to make that possible with this unique intensive program."

The \$25,000 grant to **Foothill Unity Center** will augment purchasing for their Back to School Distribution program, which is anticipated to provide over 2,000 boys and girls ages five to 17 with clothes, school supplies, special needs equipment and haircuts. This program is focused on assisting low-income families in need.

"It is amazing how the community rallies around this project," said Joan Whitenack, Executive Director of Foothill Unity Center. "We are so appreciative to have the Walmart Foundation play an instrumental role in the success of these children.

The Walmart Foundation granted \$25,000 to the **EI Monte/South EI Monte Emergency Resources Association** (ERA), which serves nearly 19,000 clients a year in need by providing funds for rent, food, transportation, bereavement costs and clothing. The grant will support the organization's various resources provided to clients, which include emergency food assistance to nearly 400 people a week and federal funding for rent assistance case management.

"When we heard the Walmart Foundation was granting us with this miracle, we were beyond words," said Lilian Rey, Executive Director of ERA. "With an annual budget of \$230,000, this grant will be instrumental in making sure our clients are served to the best of our ability."

Ettie Lee Youth and Family Services (ELYFS) will use the Walmart Foundation's \$25,000 grant to support customized education for 72 incoming at-risk teenage males and working toward the construction of an instructional cafeteria. The Opportunities for Learning Charter School housed in the ELYFS Pomona facility which

focuses on academic accomplishment and behavioral adjustment through individualized learning and interventions.

"The students at the on-grounds school will be able to learn not just important lessons in the classroom, but with the new cafeteria that the Walmart Foundation's grant will help fund, these young men will also learn real life skills--the advantages of teamwork and the gratification of doing a job well done," said Clayton Downey, President and CEO of Ettie Lee Youth & Family Services. "While the school continues to grow, we are excited to form this partnership with Walmart and the Walmart Foundation in creating a path for future success."

To date, in 2010, the Walmart Foundation's California State Giving Program has given a total of \$615,000 in grants to California non-profits including: The Foodbank of Santa Barbara County; Atascadero Loaves & Fishes; California Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom; Boys & Girls Club of Redlands; San Diego Food Bank; North County Health Project; and Mama's Kitchen.
